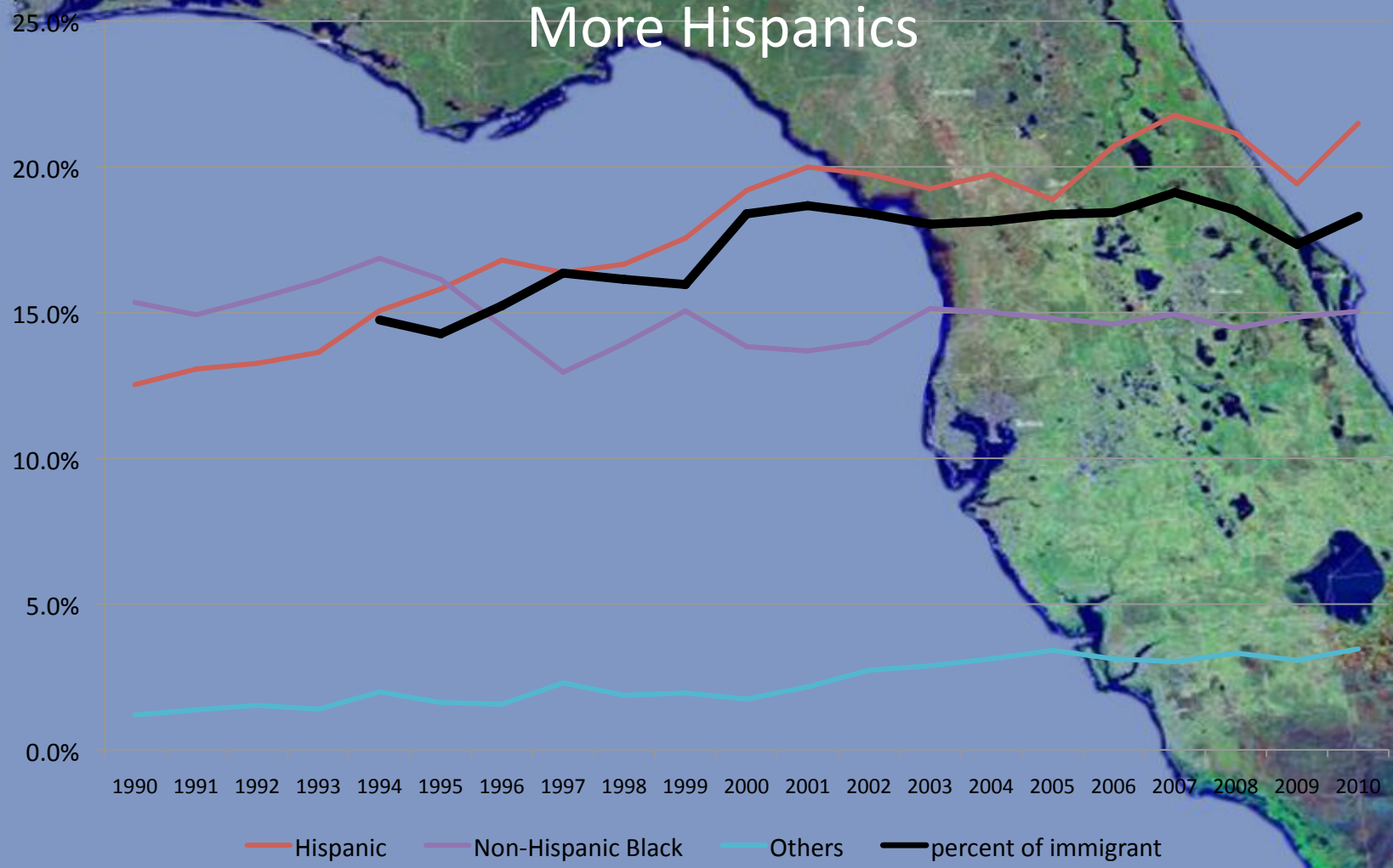

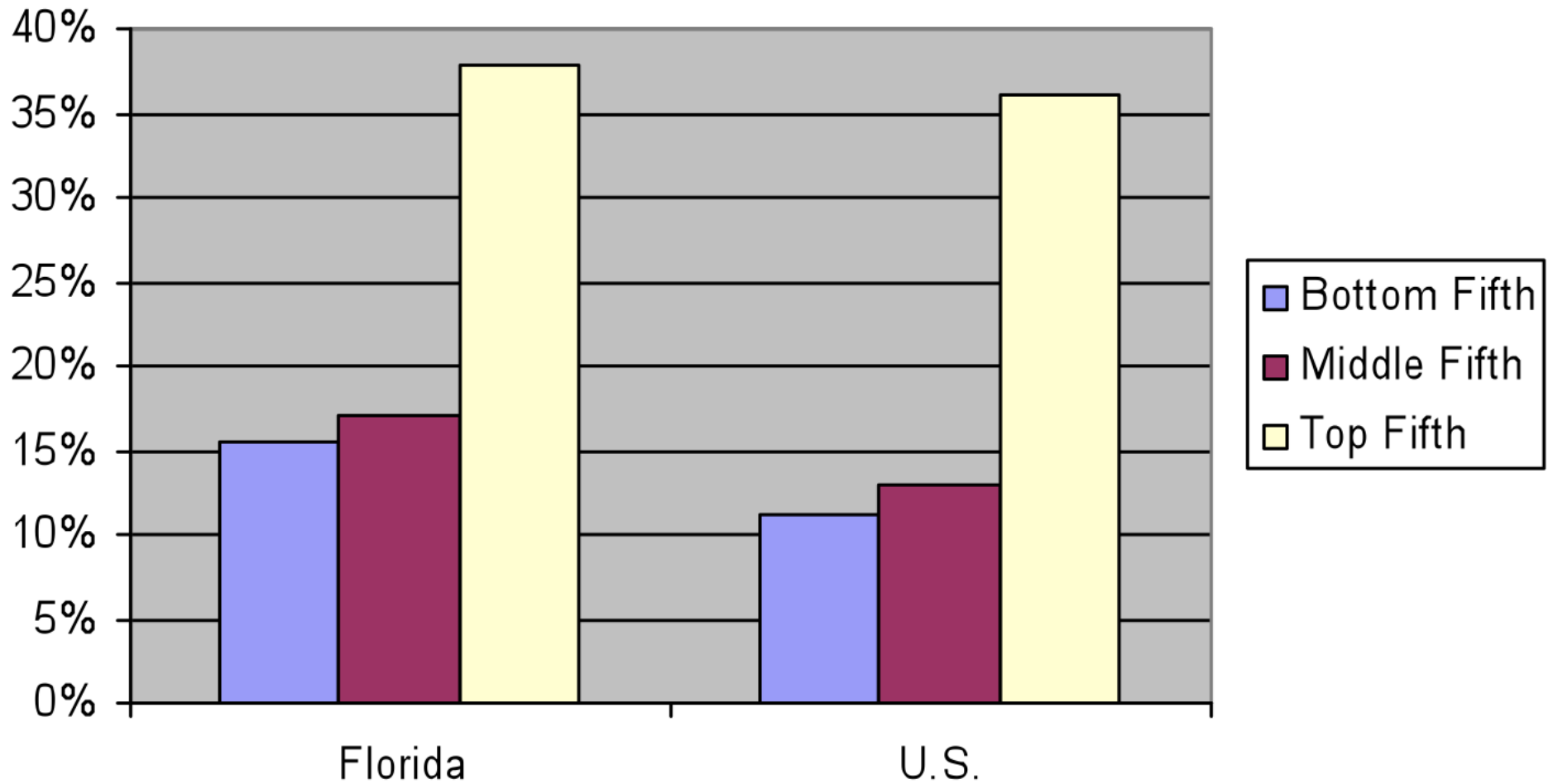

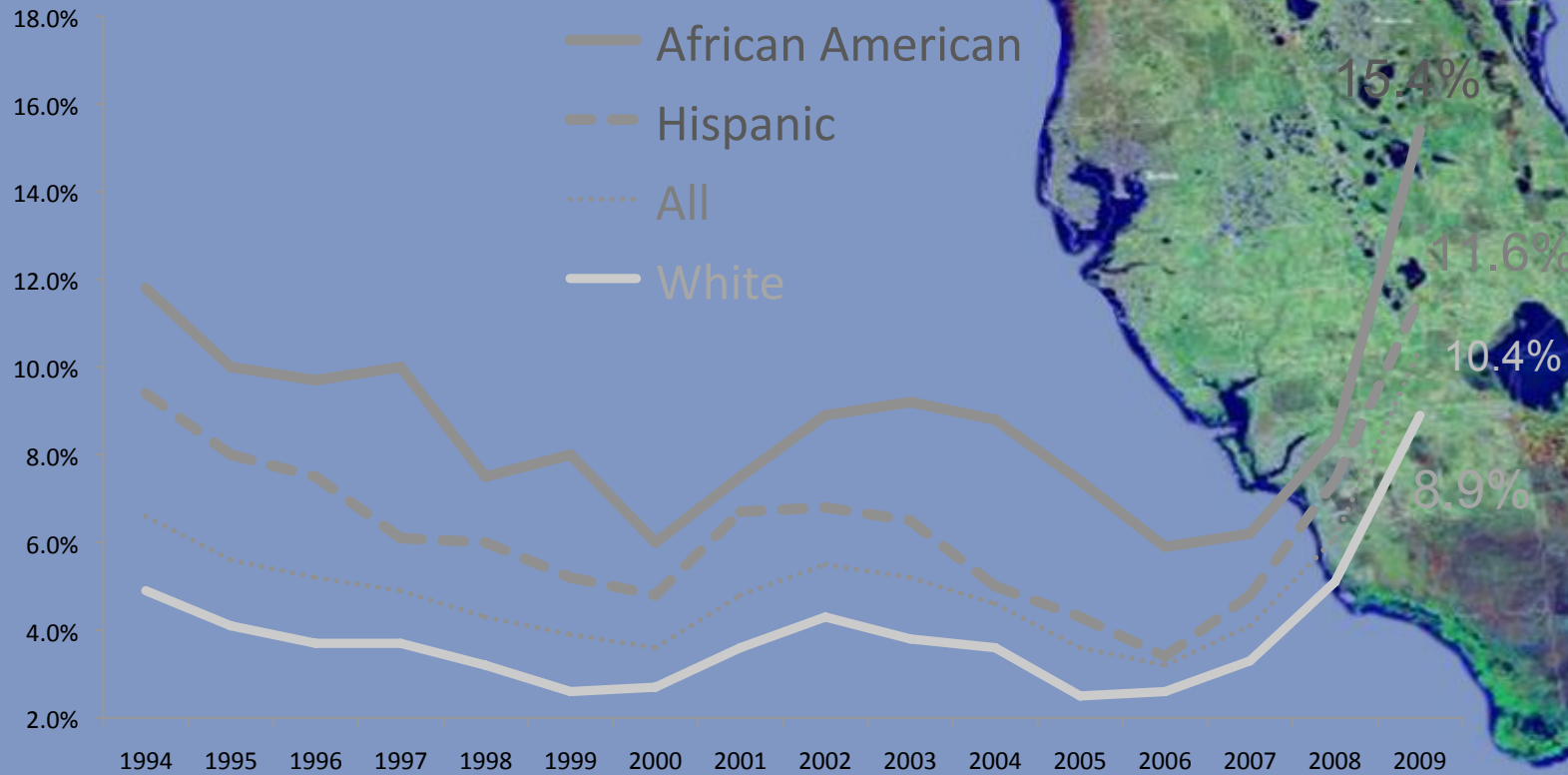
Long Term Unemployment Rate Unemployed 6 Months or More

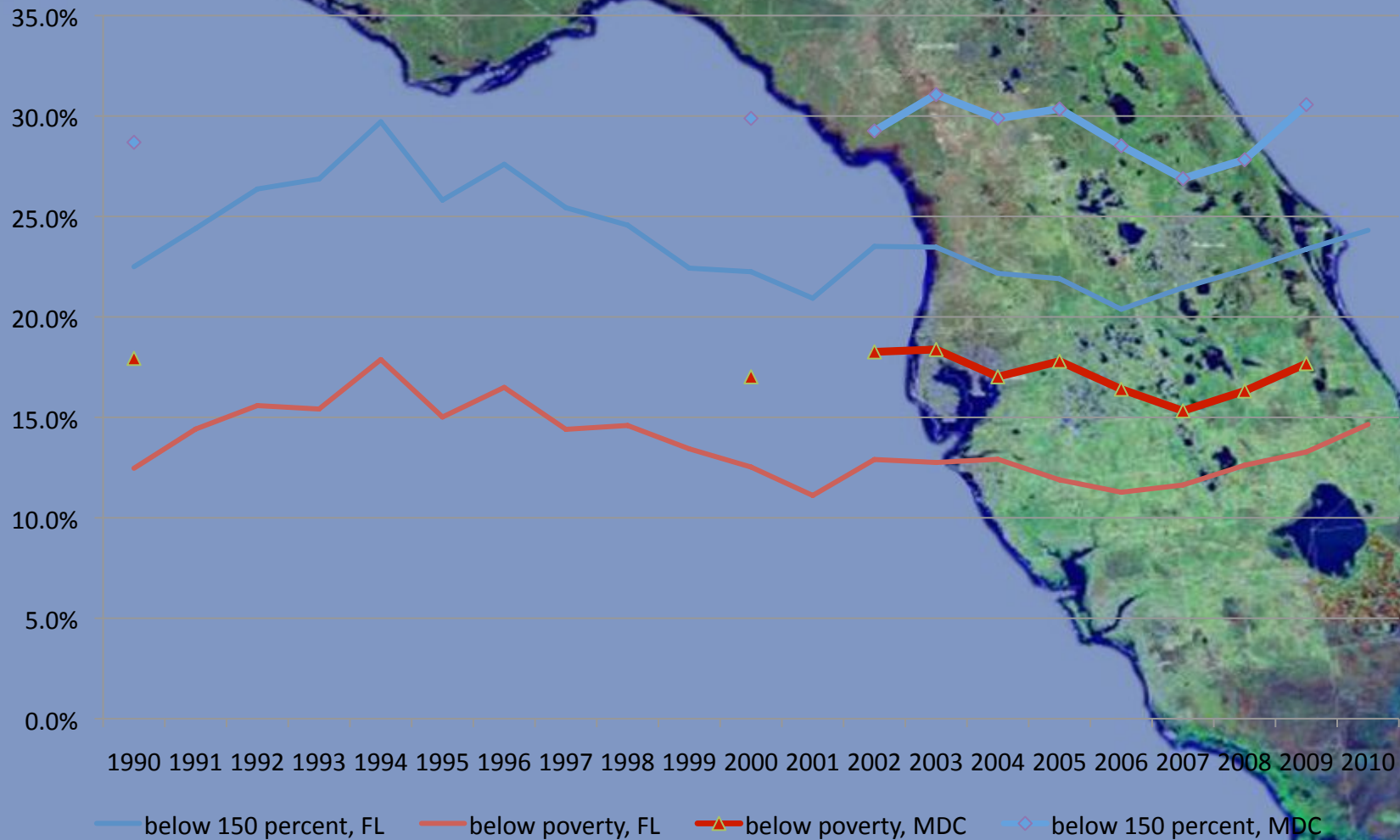
Unemployment bad for all, but worse for some

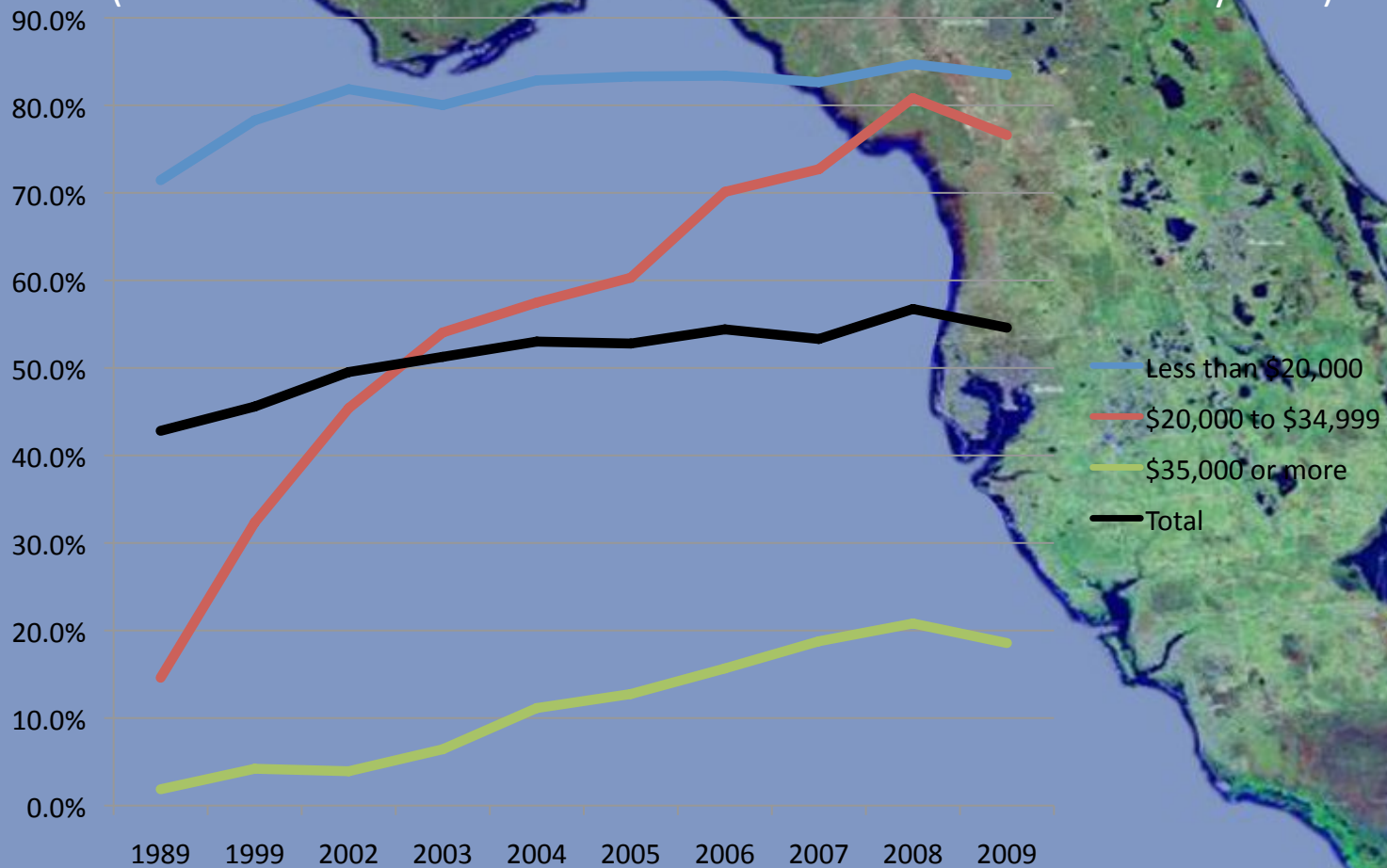
